### *Know the Difference: Between AA/AS TRANSFER DEGREES AND AAS TERMINAL DEGREES*

One of the main areas of confusion students present themselves with when they come into my office is because they are in the wrong degree. If students are planning to transfer to a university for a Bachelor degree, the BUS-AA or BUS-AS are the correct avenues.

Often students in Accounting, Marketing, Finance & Credit, Business Management, and Business Administration believe they will transfer to a university upon completion only to find they are missing credits for transfer. These programs are Associates of Applied Science Degrees not to be confused with the Transfer Degrees.

Salt Lake Community College Business Transfer degrees are preparing you for admission into the upper division level of a university. Students completing the BUS-AA or BUS-AS Transfer degrees will select their majors or emphases when they are at the university level. Students completing any of the Associate of Applied Science degree programs are preparing for employment in those fields, applying their education to the work world sooner. The catalog description for the Accounting-AAS program, for example, states:

#### Transfer/Articulation Information

This is a 2-year terminal degree. Several courses are transferable to other institutions. Students should check with the receiving institution to determine credit transferability.

Students who are interested in pursuing courses leading to a Bachelor's Degree in Accounting should follow the courses listed in the Business Associate of Science or the Business Associate of Arts Degree listed elsewhere in this catalog.

## DegreeWorks & Graduation

Most students are now familiar with and effectively utilizing DegreeWorks to better assist in knowing what classes are completed and what remains to complete for their academic goals. While an excellent program, DegreeWorks is not without issues and thus, it's helpful to review the Program Description for your academic goal available in the online catalog. Some find it a little difficult to locate program descriptions on the online catalog, so you should now be able to locate a link to your program in the major section of your DegreeWorks audit. Students are encouraged to review and become familiar with it. Often, there is information that is nuanced, which can't always be placed in DegreeWorks given space constraints.

Additionally, DegreeWorks has to be set not only to the correct major but to the correct catalog year. Which is 'the correct catalog year'? Students can use the catalog they began their studies or the catalog of their graduation year, or any catalog between those two. Faculty periodically make changes to the programs. That is why some students are confused seeing one set of rules, but then wonder about conflicting information another time. In the same way students can change their majors (MySLCC, Academic & Records, Academic Planning, Program Change Request), students can and should also change their Catalog Year (MySLCC, Academic & Records, Academic & Records, Academic & Records, Academic Planning, these must agree with the application information. Often students have the correct major, but the incorrect catalog year, which creates confusion.

Business students who utilize the General Education option are often confused. Those students are well advised to remain as either Business-AA or Business-AS students for several reasons. First, as Business majors, it's much easier to see what classes you need to complete and to transfer to the university of choice. Second, as Business majors, you will receive emails and information made available to you which is not available to General Education majors. Third, Business scholarships are only available for students listed as Business majors or students completing majors within the School of Business. Fourth, a Business-AA or –AS degree is viewed more professionally than a General Education-AA or –AS. And finally, you can always still graduate with a GS degree in addition to the Business major once the requirements are completed.
