We are proud to announce the publication of the 2024 anthology, "The Wake of Our Waning Sea, Lake as Legacy/Lake as Future" Community Anthology 2024.

"Wake of Our Waning Sea" creates a space for Utah to process the slow and somber loss of the Great Salt Lake.

The photographs, poems, and narratives included within this work embody that of wake for the Great Salt Lake. It is a remembrance of our very own sea, of the disassembled soul that once was a large part of Northern Utah. It is a communal vigil for our framework, our namesake. It is a call for an awakening of our diminishing home.

As our days with the Great Salt Lake begin to dwindle, we will need one another's experiences, memories, and feelings to lean on. In doing so, we can earnestly ask for a saving, for a reawakening.

This anthology will be published this Fall and celebrated at the 2024 Great Salt Lake Anthology Gala/Launch on September 19th, 2024.

A Former Skier Asks Questions About Nomenclature

"Microglacier" the skier calls a patch of snow in August. hoping it remains year-round

as in "microscope" -- evidence of change splashed across a plastic slip made visible by that blaze of light

Who told me the snow-fields dotting Bald Mountain might count as glaciers? We have no metric, no minimum requirement

of depth or shape. Could the patch of ice protected by the shade of a ski lift be called a glacier, if it remains?

I used to comb hillsides with binoculars searching for these muddy strips which to the touch resemble

bags of sugar poorly stored and crumbling. I skied every month; I carved ephemeral spirals

though microglaciers, watching them rot like animal tracks, until winter or another fanatic interred them.

is *fanatics* the proper term for us? As in "fanum," the temple of zealots and half-possessed priests. A type

of ritual, to be sure, donning neoprene bare-legged down to our boots. I want to believe we worshipped

the microglaciers, in our way. We imagined glaciers as living tongues of ice, which hulked and crawled across arctic landscapes

our slopes only specters of these blue behemoths. "Microglaciers" which is not a lexicon word

or a word at all. What do we call a shrunken ice floe whose mass no longer inspires grandeur? It trickles its flesh through valleys newly lush

of wildflowers, as retreating crevasses expel the bones of recreators in a gush of fluid leaving only shaded piles of snow

Do we call it "microglacier?" As in traversable easily skied, such that criss-cross lines mark the snow like pork-skin bound for a fryer

We talk about how we may not be able to live here much longer


And then we go back to talking about the farmers markets, the thrift stores, bike rides, the unique collection of people this city attracts


Wake of Our Waning Sea: 2024 Launch and Gala
