Salt Lake Community College is embarking on an exciting new model in Academic Advising. Beginning this Fall Semester, the School of Business will be undertaking a pilot program that will provide an exciting pathway for all beginning students in the following programs:

- Accounting
- Business AA and AS Degrees
- Business Management
- Finance and Credit
- Marketing Management
- Legal Studies

In this Pathway model, each new student in the School of Business is assigned to a “new student advisor.” Michael Purles is the Pathway Advisor in the School of Business and has been responsible for development of this program. From School of Business Orientation through to graduation all new students should meet with Michael as their advisor. Students will have required advising visits at key points on their educational journey as well as being able to call upon Michael for help when needed.

Michael has been with the College for three years and came to the Business School from SLCC General Advising with a varied business background. SLCC Book Voucher Program

The Book Voucher Program is offered through the Office of Financial Aid and Scholarships, and is available to students who are in need of assistance purchasing textbooks. Students are required to repay any assistance by the end of the semester. The voucher expires after the last day to add classes for that part of the term.

Students must:

- Be enrolled at least half-time
- Have no outstanding charges, except current tuition and fees
- Have no non-payment hold or messages on their student or financial aid records
- Have a means to repay the debt
- Not have received a financial aid refund for the current term
- Student must not be on the banned list, from the SLCC College Store

The Computer Sciences and Information Systems Division hosted our annual girl's technology camp, Bytes of Brilliance. The Bytes Camp is catered to girls ages 10-17 in hopes of shedding light on the importance of women going into STEM field careers. This year's camp, turned out to be one of the biggest with 36 participants from all different backgrounds. We had the pleasure of working directly with a Granite School District after school program to allow girls with less opportunity a chance to explore the technology camp. We were also fortunate enough to team up with bright individuals from major technology companies such as Apple, Adobe, Microsoft, and IM Flash. During our tour of IM Flash the girls learned how crucial engineers can be to the progression of technology. At Microsoft they were given an introduction to coding by game applications. The students also gained knowledge on cyber security and how to protect themselves against certain cyber situations. The rewarding part of Bytes of Brilliance is the ability to bring dozens of girls together to learn about Computer Science, in hopes of promoting the change and expansion of what women in the industry can do for the future. As the camp came to a close, a few girls expressed "I am going to be a software engineer," and "I am going to be a mechanical engineer," as we hoped this would show those things to be possible. They not only gained knowledge about computer science, but they gained confidence, friendships, and a glimpse of how incredible STEM careers can be.
